

FINANCIAL REPORT

General: The financial statements are prepared under cash basis accounting. Revenues and expenses are recognized at the time cash is received or paid out. Wisdom Project 2030 is a 501(c)(3) with a fiscal year-end of December 31.

Descriptions:

Wisdom Project 2030,Inc: Wisdom Project 2030 captures the wisdom of Hall County residents, age 55 and older, for the good of our community. Our members are graduates of the Wisdom Project Program and are known as Wisdom Keepers.

Operations: Management activities such as insurance, IT and marketing. Member dues are \$55 per year (95 members in 2023 and 91 members in 2022). Marketing is directed to the community and potential Wisdom Keepers. Restricted donations are made for a specific purpose by the donor.

Wisdom Project Program: Over eight sessions, the Wisdom Project Program builds a multi-faceted and dynamic view of Gainesville and Hall County. Sessions are designed to help participants identify ways to apply their skills and follow their interests while contributing to our community. Wisdom Project 2030 hosted a Fall program in 2023.

Member Meetings: Monthly meetings offer education and fellowship among Wisdom Keepers. During 2023, we held lunch meetings at various locations in Gainesville.

Symposium: Wisdom Project 2030, Inc. and the UNG Center for Healthy Aging hosted a Community Symposium, "Dance from the Inside Out, Celebrating Life After 55," on May 19-20, 2023. A symposium type event is planned for every other year.


Platinum Seal of Transparency




Our Vision:

Wisdom Project 2030 will be a nationally recognized model for senior leadership and community improvement.

Our Program:

The Wisdom Project 2030 Program was developed to connect our members to the needs of our community and to improve Hall County through action and advocacy. The program is composed of eight full-day sessions, including an Orientation Day and Class Graduation. These are normally held between August and November and are designed to provide dynamic, informational interactions with individuals and leaders throughout the Hall County area. Six sessions educate and inform potential new members about the concerns of community leaders and encourage participants to think about ways to improve our community.






Program Graduates Become "Wisdom Keepers"

After graduation, monthly meetings and lunches enable members to continue learning about opportunities and to join life experiences with community needs. Participation encourages fellowship and networking among Wisdom Keepers and often leads to stronger project outcomes, social opportunities, and lasting friendships.







2023 PROJECTS

Projects are how Wisdom Keepers work to improve our community. Our members initiate projects after learning about problems or opportunities from community leaders. Working together with community organizations ensures sustainable results.

Wisdom Project's TOTAL HOURS spent volunteering in active community projects in 2023 was over 2,000 hours, our largest total hours recorded to date! In addition, this total does **not** include an individual Wisdom Keeper's work outside of active projects, including volunteer activities, collaborations, chairperson's time, or new class time developing project ideas.

We are proud of the following projects that were completed in 2023 and the projects that are still active. We extend our thanks to all Wisdom Keepers who give their time and efforts to improve our community! More information about each project follows.

COMPLETED PROJECT #1

The HUB Dress and Prepare for Success Boutique" Project

The goal of this project was to support Gainesville High School's HUB, a student success center for Hall County and Gainesville City families.

Results:

- Wisdom Keepers Mary Hinshaw, team leader, Beverly Nordholz, and Susan Moss helped procure and organize dresses, suits, and accessories for students who might otherwise be reluctant to attend their High School Prom because of lack of resources for the specific clothing needs, such as evening wear.
- For students in need of clothing for walking or riding the bus to school, the Team also collected rain ponchos, coats, hats, and gloves.
- The team will continue to support the HUB by volunteering to collect special clothing for teens in need.
- This Wisdom Keeper team developed a relationship with the HUB directors at Gainesville High School which laid the foundation for other volunteer projects between the school and Wisdom Keepers.


First Responder - Beyond Dementia



The Beyond Dementia Coalition mission is to reduce stigma and inspire people through awareness and education to recognize, engage, assist, and ultimately embrace people living with dementia as valued and beloved members of the community. The Virtual Dementia Tour (VDT) is designed to train police and fire first responders on how to recognize and interact with those in the community who have dementia. VDT is a simulated experience of what it feels like to have dementia.

Results:

- After completing the 2022 project, "Beyond Dementia Emergency Comfort Kits," Project Chair **Bill Wittel** organized a team to research and bring to the community a simulated experience of living with dementia.
- The team worked with the "Dementia Tour," a state compliant dementia training experience that is part of a multi-modal education platform tailored to each audience of healthcare providers, first responders, organizations, and/or local governments.
- The kick-off event, a Virtual Dementia Tour, was held in Summer 2023. It was specifically tailored for and exclusively offered to first responders in north Georgia, including EMTs, firefighters, and police officers in Gainesville and Hall County.
- The Beyond Dementia Coalition will further its educational intentions by offering quarterly dementia simulation experiences using the Virtual Dementia Tour for the general public.
- The project was featured in the **Gainesville Times**. Wisdom Keeper and Project Chair **Bill Wittel** is shown below with Maggie Volpe, INK Executive Director, as she participates in the virtual tour demonstration. (*Photo by Scott Rogers, Gainesville Times.*)




COMPLETED PROJECT #3

WP Affordable Housing Project Transitioned to United Way One Hall Financial Stability Committee in December 2023

Since 2019, Duane has been working on the Affordable Housing Project He has given over 1,854 Volunteer Hours so far!



Wisdom Project 2030 extends great appreciation to **Duane Schlereth** for his years of work on the Accessible Housing Project in Hall County. Duane became a Wisdom Keeper in 2017 and has worked determinedly on housing issues since 2019.

Duane began the WP project for Affordable Housing in 2018-2019 when he developed an extensive state of housing report in Hall County. He published a report: "Homelessness, Temporary, and Affordable Housing Project," which consists of 16 pages detailing the situation in Hall County.

He presented his findings not only to Wisdom Keepers but to many entities in the Hall community. In addition, Duane recruited other Wisdom Keepers to help educate elected officials and business leaders about what affordable housing really means, how important it is for our community to find solutions for the supply of such housing, and what officials and leaders can do.

Duane teamed with United Way's One Hall Financial Stability Committee and soon became the co-chair of the Committee because of his passion for housing issues, his leadership and his knowledge. The Committee's mission was to expand affordable housing and affordable rental housing and help lower-income families, who would not otherwise qualify to buy their first home.

COMPLETED PROJECT

Affordable Housing Project, continued



In 2021 the focus was to explore the use of a Community Land Trust Program which shows that 58% of first-time homeowners go on to buy a home at market rates. In 2022 the Committee continued to identify long-term housing needs and supply, define enabling rules and regulations and develop community education on the issues. **Robert Horne** and other Wisdom Keepers worked alongside Duane in his research of other communities and affordable housing options.



In 2023, work continued with research into Accessory Dwelling Units and Manufactured Housing for the Comprehensive Plan. The team also participated in updating the Water Plan. In June, the One Hall Financial Stability Committee hosted a Housing Forum at Brenau University. The Committee continues research on activities in other communities, such as Housing Trust Funds, and submits comments to both City of Gainesville and Hall County for changes in land use and zoning regulations.





As the Wisdom Project 2030 Affordable Housing team transitions to United Way One Hall, Wisdom Keepers will continue to volunteer. We have found transitions of this type ensure long term sustainability. (Similar transitions happened last year with the Mental Health First Aid project transitioning to One Hall Mental Health and the Age-Friendly Project to the City of Gainesville.) We hope to continue to hear from Duane with updates on housing issues and ways Wisdom Keepers can help. The community will continue to benefit from Duane's passion and interest in Accessible Housing.

ACTIVE PROJECT #1

Informed Trauma Project

The Informed Trauma Project Team's goal is to create a collaborative network in the community to educate and inform on the effects of trauma in our children. The team is developing resources and a framework for toolkits to assist foster parents, teachers, volunteers, churches, etc. who work with children who have experienced trauma.

Updates:

- Representing Wisdom Project 2030, the team began a partnership with the Hall-Dawson County CASA to sponsor an internship with Brenau University doctoral student, Korina Silva, as she was completing her doctoral capstone project.
- Korina, who has since received her Ph.D., worked side-by-side with CASA, took part in panel discussions, and organized a three-part Zoom meeting book club utilizing the book, "What Happened to You."
- The team determined training needs for the project with a vision to create traumainformed community spaces that can provide the education and support needed for foster children and those who have experienced trauma in their lives.
- They have developed a Digital Resource Book Club on the topic of trauma with Brenau, UNG, and Lanier Tech students enrolled in medical related classes. The material developed was deemed important enough that the Occupational Therapy Program at Brenau will include the material in their curriculum. CASA will continue to use the material for future training purposes.
- The project team is also involved in joining PACE, an international organization that offers information necessary for building resilient communities including research, online classes, blogs, articles, tool kits, etc.

ACTIVE PROJECT #2

Green House Homes Project

The goal of the Green House Homes Committee was to find and bring alternatives to nursing home options in Hall County and encourage adoption of innovative models of person-centered care. Over the seven years since the Committee was formed, education and advocacy has confirmed that success can only be achieved through legislative change. The good news is that it can help bring change beyond Hall County to seniors throughout Georgia. The Committee started work in 2022 with the Georgia Coalition on Aging's advocacy group, Co-Age, to educate legislators about the need for greater options in long-term care. This created opportunities to speak with our legislators, as well as work with national organizations that share our goals.

Updates:

- This 2022 work resulted in a four-hour hearing on expanding long-term care options in September 2023. A bill proposing a special legislative study committee on the topic remains open with the Georgia House Committee on Human Relations and Aging.
- The work has also opened opportunities to participate in Co-Age's efforts to educate legislators on the need for Certificate of Need (CON) reforms in long-term care. These licenses are required to operate a skilled nursing facility and limit the number of homes that can operate, directly affecting the entry of operators with new models of care.
- Green House Committee members, **Carol Hanlon** and **Nan Carvell**, will continue to work with Co-Age as representatives on the "Moving Forward Coalition," a nationwide workgroup/discussion series on policy strategies for building more small-home nursing models. The workgroup has been formed by The Center for Innovation, a collaboration between two national person-centered care organizations, The Green House Project and the Pioneer Network.

ACTIVE PROJECT #3

Horizon Academy Youth Development

The mission of the Horizon Academy Youth Development project is to create a program in conjunction with The Gainesville City Schools and local businesses to provide a series of hands-on learning experiences for at-risk youth. Wisdom Keepers will work with students to discover what interests them as career possibilities and then create a program to engage them with employees currently in these roles.

Updates:

- · After working with the Gainesville High School HUB coordinator and Horizon Academy Coordinator, the team determined that the Youth Development project would be most beneficial for the Seniors at the Horizon Academy.
- The Wisdom Keeper team conducted an assessment to determine students' strengths and areas of career interest. That assessment information will assist the students with resume building and provide background to business spokespeople who are speaking to the students about employment opportunities upon graduation.
- · Wisdom Keepers partnered with the students from The Horizon Center and walked alongside them at the Gainesville High School College and Career Fair. The College and Career Fair gave the students an opportunity to practice their speaking skills and gather information.
- This project continues in a pilot phase with each session being evaluated. The Committee also continues to recruit team members for 2024, especially male members.



ACTIVE PROJECT #4

Services Data Base

Wisdom Keeper **Gary Vogel** and his WK Project Team initially planned to develop four database initiatives to increase awareness of activities in Hall Count with the following goals:

- · Assist the United Way of Hall County in launching their volunteer website
- Build a "needs" list where anyone can find a place to help with material or financial contributions
- Develop a listing of all the service providers in Hall County
- · Link all of the social activities in Hall County

The team quickly discovered that the **United Way Volunteer Porta**l and the **Explore Gainesville Website** would address most of the initiatives above. As a result, the focus evolved to building more awareness of the UW volunteer portal and encouraging social service organizations to enroll and enter their services and needs.





Updates:

- · During their research, the team discovered the Community Resource Guide developed by the Hall County School System. They also found a new project between Northeast Georgia Health System and the United Way called "Unite Us." This is a social care network platform that allows for electronic referrals and communication between nonprofits and service organizations to connect local individuals and families to the social services they need in real-time to navigate life and find pathways out of poverty. They realized "Unite Us" and the Community Resource Guide needed to know about each the other and helped with that introduction.
- For 2024, the short-term attention will be on "Unite Us" and calling potential agencies to add them to the platform. The team hopes to have the prospect calls completed in January and the demos of "Unite Us" scheduled for early February.
- Continuing efforts on this project will be to collaborate with the United Way's "Week of Caring" in September to host a Volunteer Expo on a county wide basis similar to what is held annually at Cresswind and other venues.

ACTIVE PROJECT #5

Services For Those Without A Home

This project initially focused on three areas to help individuals in our county:

• Identify laundromats that will allow individuals to come do their laundry, possibility charge their phone, and have a meal

- · Provide "Mobile Shower Trailers" or potential other sites for individuals to shower
- Provide creative art classes to help individuals have a short respite from their daily struggles to find food or a place to sleep

Updates:

 After research, the team discovered that similar existing services are offered to some degree in the community.

- **Michael Fisher**, from Ninth District Opportunity and a fellow Wisdom Keeper, connected the team with "Clean Start," (the shower hosts) who provide a Friday meal and shower located in a truck parking lot at the corner of Dorsey and Davies Streets.
- Mike Mills from Humana Healthcare sets up and offers a painting table for participants every Friday.
- Several Wisdom Keepers, who are very interested in helping this population, volunteer in the bi-weekly events by serving lunch and assisting with the needs of individuals in the area.
- During 2024, the team will continue to research options for their original idea of holding and sponsoring Art Classes in an indoor setting.

Our original WK 2019 "Plan in a Can" project team completed training to become members of the NEGH Volunteer Auxiliary and they continue to support the hospital's "Plan in a Can" Program. They meet twice a month to assemble the department's "Plan in a Can" kits using the Medical Information Sheet and the Emergency Information Label that they originally developed. They also occasionally assist the Advance Directive Department at Health Expos and Fairs to promote the importance of Advance Planning and emergency preparation.

INVESTING IN MEMBERS' CONTINUING EDUCATION WITH I UNCH AND I FARN MEETINGS

We are very appreciative of the generosity of time and knowledge from individuals and organizations who speak at our Member Meetings and Luncheons. These presentations help Wisdom Keepers learn more about the community, stay current on community needs, and find opportunities to contribute towards those needs.
